2. These recommendations come from the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF), the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP), the Bright Futures (BF) Guidelines, and the Institute of Medicine (IOM).

3. These vaccines are for all ages and should only be administered by a healthcare provider if risk factors are presented in the patient: Pneumococcal Polysaccharide Vaccine; Pneumococcal Conjugate Vaccine; Meningococcal; Hepatitis A; Hepatitis B.

4. Although screening for prostate cancer with prostate-specific antigen (PSA) can reduce mortality from prostate cancer, the absolute risk reduction is very small. Given limitations in the design and reporting of the randomized trials, there remain important concerns about whether the benefits of screening outweigh the potential harms to quality of life, including the substantial risks for over diagnosis and treatment complications. Men who are willing to accept a substantial risk of morbidity associated with treatment in return for a small reduction in mortality might reasonably choose to be screened. Men who are at increased risk of prostate cancer because of race or family history may be more likely to benefit from screening. Based on this information, it is very important to discuss with your physician the risks and benefits of prostate cancer screening for yourself.
